## Decisions of peace up to people says **Bishop Dingman**

The people of this country begin making decisions about the future, and stop sitting back, leaving all decisions up to

the administration. Those were the words of Bishop Maurice Dingman, Bishop of the Roman Catholic diocese in Des

Bishop Dingman was in Pella Thursday He spoke to several groups, including the Pella Ministerial Association, students and faculty at Central College, and the Pella Coalition for Peace. Bishop Dingman also attended classes at Pella Community High School

Bishop speaking at the Central College Chapel, said America is entering the third of three great debates in this country's history The first debate was America's decision to declare independence from Great Britian and our second great debate, according to Bishop Dingman, was the debate over slavery. Our present debate is that of nuclear

"This is a very desperate

moment in the history of our country, in the history of all said Bishop mankind ' Dingman "We have to be equal to the solution of that problem. Thankfully, we the people, will ultimately make that decision We as a democracy must make that decision. What are we going to do with nuclear weapons?"

Bishop Dingman said, the escalation nuclear arms, individuals are often looking for answers for peace and security

"I start by reading the scriptures I think the most important word is the Word of God We must somehow or another grasp the values of the Gospel " he said.

"I don't make decisions Dingman, that are political That's for you the people What I come to do is to bring you a message and touch your conscience, that's all we want to do. We want to give you the principal, and we want to give you the Judeo-Christian policies, hopes and dreams that will help you people make the decisions '

Bishop Dingman spoke of a pastoral letter on nuclear disarmament, which was drawn up in Iowa He had

Buerkens also wrote a column, "Bucksaw" and a column "Who and Where" for the Chronicle. In 1973 he was named the second
